



AIDS WALK on October 7



Welcome to Breeze! Last year IUCC migrated to a different software to manage important church data such as attendance, contact information, events, financial giving, and much more. The software is user friendly with wonderful applications to support smooth and efficient church administration.

It is time to roll this system out to the entire congregation. Your adaptability and support in utilizing this new system will enhance our church operations. Undoubtedly, there will be a learning curve as we progress towards full implementation.

By now all corporate members on the active list should have received an introductory email to create a Breeze account (if you missed this email or have questions, please contact the office at iucc@iucc.org). Once you've located the email, please respond to the introductory message by following four simple steps:

- Login into Breeze and access your account.
- Visit your personal profile and update your information.
- Upload a profile picture.
- Explore the system's functionality: attendance, directory, giving, profile, tags.

Complete details and instructions can also be found by logging onto the IUCC website at www.iucc.org. Go to the top right hand area and click on the red button labeled "Resources," then scroll down and click on "IUCC Breeze." It will explain the process.

In the video, Bill says, "The Legacy Circle was basically created by members of IUCC and friends to make bequests to IUCC in their wills and trusts so that the services and programs of IUCC can be continued in the future."

He explains the importance of good estate planning and provides examples of how much it helps heirs avoid lengthy probate delays. In one instance, he provides an example of assisting a widowed neighbor with her care and finances before she died. As her trustee and executor, he was able to settle the majority of her estate in a timely manner. Unfortunately, one small account was not included in her trust, and that omission led to a delay of over four years in the full disposition of her estate. That's why he stresses the importance of making sure that all details are handled properly.

"IUCC is near and dear to us," Bill concludes. "We support its programs and ministries through an annual pledge during the stewardship campaign ... and we also want to make sure that the work of IUCC continues in the future, so we've designated IUCC in our will and are thus members of the Legacy Circle."

The mission of the Legacy Circle is to contribute to the long-term financial sustainability of IUCC

- through will or trust bequests
- designating IUCC as a beneficiary of an IRA, 401(K), annuity or other retirement account
- designating IUCC as a beneficiary of a life insurance policy
- through other gifts such as cash, marketable securities and marketable real estate

A gift to the IUCC Legacy Circle by members and friends of IUCC will ensure that the goals and dreams of IUCC continue for future generations!

What is planned giving?

A planned gift can be made to IUCC through your will or trust, retirement funds, and certain life insurance policy arrangements. Planned gifts are almost always funded from accumulated resources or assets rather than income and are typically planned for during the donor's lifetime but not actually received until after the donor's death. Planned giving enables individuals to make sound financial plans that consider their own needs and those of family, as well as commitments to church and charities.

Why are planned gifts important to IUCC?

By including IUCC in your planned giving, your gift will contribute to the long-term financial sustainability of IUCC for generations to come.

What is the Legacy Circle and how can I join?

Anyone who establishes a legacy gift to IUCC and has completed a Confidential Bequest Intention form is automatically made a member of the IUCC Legacy Circle. It is our means of recognizing your lasting commitment to IUCC. If you wish to be an anonymous member, you may do so. If you have already made a legacy commitment to IUCC in your estate plan, we would love to hear from you so we are able to thank you for your generosity, make you a member of the Legacy Circle, and use the information to assist in our long-term financial planning.

What types of legacy gifts are currently supported?

The Legacy Circle currently supports these types of legacy gifts:

STEPHEN MINISTRY AT IUCC ...

When you read this newsletter, our new class of six men will have only two more trainings left and then they will be commissioned as Stephen Ministers on Sunday, August 20, 2023. People often ask, "What did they study during their 40 hours of training?" Here's a peek:

- 1. Their consistent **presence** every week with a carereceiver is of paramount importance and the greatest gift one can give.
- 2. This ministry is about the art of "listening." This is the most important skill.
- 3. The power of positive **assertiveness.** There is a line in the sand as to what Stephen Ministers do.
- 4. The importance of understanding **feelings** and dealing with them creatively.
- **5. Boundaries** need to be set before the ministry begins and maintained consistently.
- Probably the most important thing that is highly stressed, even overstressed, is the pledge of confidentiality. Even one tiny breach of this issue could close down the Stephen Ministry and become a legal issue to IUCC and the UCC.
- 7. Understanding that this Ministry is **what Jesus wants** his Followers to do.
- 8. How to use **prayer and scripture** as part, or not part, of our work.

I hope this not only gives you an understanding of the power of our Stephen Ministry at IUCC but also might entice you to look further at doing this ministry as part of your faith journey.

PC @ IUCC ...

I have found over the years that the concept "Progressive Christianity" means many different things to different people in different churches. Probably, PC's biggest asset is its willingness to makes changes in concert with the times. Even the organization, Progressive Christianity (PC), has made many changes since its inception. Let me share my interpretation of what I think PC means today:

- Most important: In the church's past history, there
 was (and still is, in most churches) great emphasis on
 Jesus dying for our sins. Today, it's about Jesus and the
 Great Commandment: that we practice unconditional
 love (agape). I hear Jesus talking about accepting
 everyone (no exceptions) as they are; almost instant
 forgiveness; and a deep sense of caring for others. This
 behavior has to be modeled by each individual as well
 as by PC churches.
- 2. The PC movement respects, honors and encourages interfaith cooperation, realizing that almost all faiths want to make this a better world in which to live, each in their own way. Every faith has its strengths and weaknesses, but I find the foundation stone of almost every religion is love. PCers are not threatened by other faiths and want to work together in peace.
- 3. PCers understand the **Bible** as a religious history, rather than a literal history. The truth is not the story itself but found within that story. The Jews, who wrote the Old and New Testament, used a process called "Midrash" (a form of biblical interpretation) to understand how to find that truth. PC promotes that concept. A literal understand of the Bible almost always misses the truth within the story.
- One of the most important tasks of PC churches is to be constantly **educating** their members, because our faith ought always to be changing with the times. (My beliefs today are vastly different from my Sunday School lessons in the 1930s.)

PC churches welcome questions, encourage doubting, and want their members to keep seeking new truths. There are NO set answers. That is the only way one can grow in the faith. Braining-washing is forbidden. Constantly "seeking" is the way forward.

In the September newsletter, I'll share some more PC ideas from my perspective.
