Reflections on OC Pride

Over 25 years ago, I marched in the Long Beach Pride Parade with a group that represented a variety of Orange County LGBTQ organizations. I took my 14 year old daughter along. While we were getting into position along Ocean Avenue, someone from a nearby building hurled a rotten egg at us, and it hit my daughter in the leg. My colleagues were outraged - so very angry that someone hurt a child. I was outraged too. But you know what? While it stung for a minute, she understood from that day forward on a visceral level what the LGBTQ+ community was up against and why it was so important that we stand up as allies.

Despite that early experience, I absolutely love going to Pride parades and the festivals afterwards. I love seeing

all the happy people being their authentic selves, and I love the palpable excitement in the air as people wave rainbow flags and applaud as we walk by. I feel good about being there and showing my support. It fills my heart with love that my church is there in solidarity with the LGBTQ+ community and offering a warm invitation to visit us on Sunday morning.

At our IUCC festival booth after the parade, Alex had an array of swag he had purchased from his event budget. What a blessing he is! The temporary "tattoos" were a big hit, as well as our colorful bracelets and stickers. We had rainbow colored beads, refrigerator magnets, bubble wands, and candy. There was a crowd around our booth for much of the day as folks checked out all the goodies.

Our crafters' crochet hearts were very popular, and people seemed amazed that our members had made them by hand especially for Pride participants. When told "They're for you," people picked them up with something close to reverence, touched by the act of love and generosity of spirit they represented - the message of grace they sent.

I had two interactions that made quite an impression on me. A woman came up to the booth and held up her cell phone for me to see. It displayed a text that read, "I come from a country where people like me are hurt, imprisoned, and killed. Thank you for being here and for your support." She never said a word, just showed me the text and walked away. It brought tears to my eyes. Never doubt that your simple presence can make a difference! The second interaction was with a woman who noticed we had a variety of LGBTQ+ flags, not just the rainbow ones. Our sweet Alex had ordered colorful flags representing the many different sexual and gender identities on the spectrum. She said, "Thank you for including ALL of us. It means a lot." [Alex said he'd heard that from others too.]

There were some haters, of course. There always are at events like this. For the most part the police kept them on the sidelines, separated from the crowd (you can see the officer in the foreground of the picture below, standing guard). But they were scattered along the parade route with their gigantic signs, shouting unintelligible things at us through bullhorns. They seemed quite intent on convincing the crowd to repent from sin and find Jesus.

Alex posted on Facebook that one of them came up to our booth and tried to bait our volunteers, wanting to know how we could believe as we did and still follow the Bible.

> Alex got to use his professional call center skills to diffuse the situation. He told the man that these were volunteers and not ordained, and his questions would be better answered by our pastor. He gave the man our brochure and pointed out the church email. Alex just kept reiterating that he needed to take his questions to our pastor. He kept his cool and told the man he was welcome to take some

candy, stickers, and to email our pastor with his questions. Instead, the man ended up just walking off without taking anything (including the brochure with the email).

I always wonder how people like that can cherry-pick Bible verses to justify their hate while missing the whole point of what Jesus taught - to love our neighbors as ourselves, to show goodness and kindness to others, and to welcome the stranger. My friend Ken thinks they may be misguided souls who will someday reach a point where they challenge their old beliefs, reflect on interactions like this, and come around to a new way of thinking. I hope he's right.

For me, these scenarios of grace juxtaposed with hatred only serve to reinforce how vitally important it is for us as a congregation to be present and supportive at events like this so our LGBTQ+ siblings will see in real time that we are here for them. We care, we show up, and we practice love and compassion. With everything happening in the world right now, it's the least we can do as followers of Jesus. I'm confident that radiating a loving and accepting presence sends a far more powerful message than a few horrible signs ever will.

Have you visited our IUCC website in the last 3 months? I hope the answer is YES. If not, go visit it! See the new look. Now that the general bones of the new website have been set, it's time to make it evolve into something better. That requires your feedback!

One of the most important analytics of a website is its daily visitors. With the new ECC website, our daily visits

Keep in mind we are all volunteers and I am an electrical engineer, not an IT specialist, so please keep your ideas simple ones that don't require hours a day to accomplish. We have plenty of ideas and would love to share them with you, but we do not want to influence any ideas you might have. So please ask yourself: What would it take to get me to visit <u>iucc.org</u> more often? Any ideas to get your peers, people older/younger than you to visit? Our goal is to get back up to 60 people a day or even higher!

IUCC Website Visibility

Let's make IUCC number 1 on Google! We have talked about this before, but there is always more that can be done. There are three things you can do now that will greatly improve our standing on Google:

- If you google IUCC for any reason, even by accident, do not close your internet but instead click on one of the links for IUCC. It looks embarrassing when only 21% of people who search the term "IUCC" actually click on our website. Makes Google wonder if there is a different IUCC people are looking for.
- 2. Now that you are on the IUCC page, look around, set your phone down and use the restroom, do whatever it takes to keep on the page for at least 90 seconds. Google loves to see people spending more than 30 seconds on a page. It means you might be interested in that company. Anything over 5 minutes is excessive and will make other data so don't just visit our website and leave it open in the background while you go to the beach.
- 3. Check out more than the home page. Google LOVES people who visit multiple pages on a website. While you are on the website, look under what's happening. Check out the events listed. How about checking out the News & More page? Check out the MYP page too! They have loads happening all the time.

With you help, we can make IUCC the place to be, as far as Google is concerned.





Hi, My name is Duane Vajgrt. Most of you know me best as a board member of Radiant Health Centers or as co-chair of the Fund Development Committee, but I'm also a member of the Legacy Circle about which I would like to speak with you today.

For those of you that don't know, the Legacy Circle is a planned giving program intended to make IUCC financially sustainable well into the future. As a 13 year member of this church, and one so impressed with the work that our church does, especially in the arena of social justice, I want to ensure that IUCC is able to do its invaluable work for decades to come.

IUCC has such a rich history of advocating on behalf of the marginalized, becoming the first open and affirming church in Orange County 32 years ago. IUCC helps shelter the homeless and feed the hungry. It provides support to immigrants and the incarcerated and so much more. IUCC is such a beacon of hope for our community that I want to be sure it continues to be able to flourish and expand its missions. By being a part of the Legacy Circle, I am helping to make sure that happens. That is why my husband Jeff and I have named IUCC as a beneficiary in our trust. As a physician dealing with major trauma at a trauma center, I know all too well how quickly life can turn on a dime. Making such preparations is the biggest favor you can do for your loved ones, including you young parents with children.

Again, please don't procrastinate on this very important issue. After you've developed a will and a trust and addressed all those important issues that I've mentioned, please consider joining me and others fellow congregants creating your IUCC legacy with a legacy gift to IUCC.

STEPHEN MINISTRY PRESENTS

The Stephen Ministry in action

As of July 1st, there are 5 Stephen Ministers and 5 Stephen Ministry Care Receivers. Our Stephen Ministry is difficult to see in action because it is done quietly. No one but the individual Stephen

Minister and SM Supervisor know any names. (Even in SM Supervision the name of the Care Receiver is **never** mentioned.)

We have 6 candidates (all men) going through 40 hours of training. (We have completed 15 hours.) They will be "Commissioned" at the end of August and within 2 weeks, each new SM will be assigned a Care Receiver, some within the congregation and some outside of it.

The denomination behind the SM organization is Missouri Lutheran Synod, vastly different from what we believe at IUCC, so the Leaders have been working diligently to tailor our SM materials to our beliefs. For instance, the SM organization calls their program "Distinctly Christian Caregiving," insinuating that Christian caregiving is better. As an interfaith/ecumenical congregation that concept does not sit well, so we have renamed this to "Distinctly Loving (agape kind) Caregiving."

The SM trainee manual states that "God is the Curegiver." This is not Progressive Christian thinking because it always brings up the question, "Why did the Curegiver "cure" my nasty neighbor of their cancer but my good friend died of hers?" IUCC does not believe in a god who does bad things to good people or visa versa.

SM's main objective is to teach our Ministers to be good "listeners" (not always easy - ask me), but we also hope that during this training and ministry that our candidates and Ministers will grow in their faith.

After 65 years of ministry, I am thoroughly convinced that the basic concept of SM is exactly what Jesus told us to do (minister) 2,000 year ago, and today this is one way that IUCC is doing it.

I am thankful to St. Paul (I am usually not very thankful to him), who gave me an idea when he substituted the word Creator for God in Romans 1:25. Bingo! My new God became **Creation**. I liked that terminology then and now. It has no gender, includes every living thing and involves the universe, all 2-4 trillion (12 zeros) galaxies. Unfortunately, most institutional churches believe this Old-Man-In-The-Sky is running the show. So, as a PC, I/we are constantly fighting that image.

An interesting thing happens when one uses the word Creation for God: the theology of the church disappears (fine with me) and suddenly Jesus becomes a total human. I like this Jesus. He's one of us.

Next month let's look at this human Jesus who has become my **Christ**, meaning my foundation stone in life. Everyone has a christ. It can include money, power, sex, winning, to name a few. For me, the human Jesus is much more tangible than the one so many Christians have invented. Stay tuned! This gets better, or maybe worse, depending upon one's point of view.

Fortunately, PC encourages followers to question and doubt our faith all the time. Bishop Spong used to say, "If you're not preaching heresy, you're not doing your job."

In my growing up years, the generous nature of my Aunties and Uncles was displayed by a one-dollar bill enclosed in my birthday cards. The dollar bill held special charm if it was crisp. She kept a flowered handkerchief in the pocket of her starched housedress.

Rikka devoted her life to the care of others. When her sister died in her twenties, Rikka helped her brother-in-law by raising Beatrice, the youngest of his three children,

from age eighteen months to adulthood. As Rikka's parents aged and were in poor health, she became their round the clock caregiver. Her mother, ill with dementia, required complete care by Rikka: she dressed, fed, toileted, and even slept with her. Rikka took in ironing jobs to supplement a small government check. Poor as she was, people loved to visit because of her hospitality. The aroma of her famous baked beans in the oven of the wood stove greeted them at the door.

Finally, after her parents died, Rikka married. Soon after the marriage, her husband's health failed. Once again,

Rikka's faithfulness, loyalty, compassion, and love were remarkable. Her years of caregiving were etched in her arthritic, wrinkled, spotted hands and expressed through her soft, watery eyes. Shortly after our wedding, we stopped by to visit Rikka. She warmly welcomed us into her tiny, but neat-as-a-model-home,

apartment. We asked, "How are you, Aunt Rikka?" In a high, thin, whimper of a voice, she responded, "Ohhhh, it goes." Her Scandinavian background and life experience didn't allow her to be effusive in any expression, whether it be negative or positive. It was her opinion that life just keeps going. We discovered that this petite lifetime giver wasn't done giving.

We left with a sack full of delectable homemade doughnuts!
