

Hello Everyone!

Did you just finish looking at posts on Facebook or watching a video short? How about visiting www.iucc.org? Probably didn't do that last one, did you. Did you know that if you visit www.iucc.org once a day like you do with everything else, you will triple our regular viewership? This means that Google is more likely to suggest IUCC to others. Our website is updated weekly before Wednesday morning with new events. Yes, these events are in the eblasts but sometimes you miss them - so check them out on the website instead!

How often do you search for something using Google? When was the last time you searched for IUCC? If no one is searching for us and clicking on our website, our position will be lower. From the Senior Pastor

I hope that with all this May Gray we have paid our dues so June Gloom keeps away! I'm ready for more sunshine and opportunities to celebrate outside in Creation as the days linger longer. I know we have all appreciated the rain, but I'm waiting for our iconic So-Cal sunny days to kick in!

Even with all those gray days of May, we had our own sense of vibrancy! Our calendar was packed full with lots of opportunities to connect meaningfully with one another and our community. We did a lot of standing and connecting in solidarity, celebrating and deepening bonds within our faith community and beyond. In worship we celebrated Mother's Day, uplifting women and holding the space for the pain and grief the day often holds. We reflected on our call as church as we worshiped together in preparation for our congregational meeting, electing new leaders among us. We celebrated Pentecost with its bold call for us to recognize the gifts of the Spirit among us: the greatest birthday gift of all - the very birth of the church and what that means to be in this together.

We participated in several events with and for the larger community. One of my favorite things to do is host a worship service for Alzheimer's patients and their caregivers. Connie Jones played songs from the forties, and we sang some familiar favorites in our worship service. Several of us joined with the South Asian Network to hold an interfaith roundtable discussion on hate towards the Asian community. Gathered at table, we broke bread (naan) together and shared stories about our faith communities and then received bystander training so we would know what to do if we witnessed a hate crime. Several of us gathered at the Irvine City Hall for a Pride Festival on Harvey Milk Day to raise the Progress Flag. It was important that IUCC was represented, since we were the first Open and Affirming congregation in Orange County. And one of our most unique events was to gather with the Jewish Community HaNefesh at the Congregation Ale House in Santa Ana for "A Rabbi and A Pastor Walk into a Bar"! We had a lively Bible Study on the book of Ruth in celebration of Shavuot, the barley festival. It was a fun way to get to know members of their synagogue as we all learned together.

A packed May paves the way for a busy June as well, offering us many opportunities to connect with one another both through worship and throughout the month. We're kicking off the first day of Pride month with a Pastor's Potluck under the sails. Bring a dish to share and something to BBQ and we'll enjoy an evening conversation as we break bread together. We're kicking off the month and ending it celebrating Pride because on Saturday, June 24, we will be marching in the OC Pride Parade, then celebrating our own Pride Sunday here at IUCC. I'm looking forward to learning more this Pride Sunday as we invite our own Christine Roy to share in a panel with drag queen Cucu Chanel as we address the nationwide attacks on trans people and drag queens while learning more about what it means to be non-binary. I think having this holy conversation will deepen all of our understanding and commitment to the queer community as we live out our call to be an Open and Affirming church.

Additionally, June brings us Juneteenth, an opportunity to celebrate African-Americans as we observe Emancipation Day, a commemoration of when enslaved people in Texas were finally set free on June 19, 1865. Our sister church in Laguna Beach, Neighborhood Congregational Church, has invited us to a Juneteenth Jubilee, a celebration of history and culture as they partner with the Laguna Beach Cultural Arts Center offering a number of activities on June 19 and throughout the week.

I hope you'll feel the sunshine this month, even if it's simply the light we share when we gather together. May you find moments where you can step outside, take advantage of the longer evenings, break bread, engage in conversation, and feed your spirit throughout the month. I invite you to intentionally join us as we continue to create a safe, inclusive, and welcoming space for you and everyone else to thrive and grow in their faith in community.

STEPHEN MINISTRY PRESENTS....

Stephen is best known as the first martyr in the early church (still within Judaism). The Stephen Ministry is named after this saint because as Acts 6:5 states, Stephen was "full of faith and the Holy Spirit" - a great role model.

In 1975, Kenneth Haugk, a Lutheran (Missouri Synod, very conservative) pastor and his wife, a nurse, developed this program to help enrich the lives of people in his church. It was a well-designed program and soon other people were clamoring to do the same in their churches. Today the Stephen Ministry is found in over 13,000 churches (with very diverse theologies), synagogues, and even mosques.

I ran across this Ministry when I, as an Episcopal priest in charge of all pastoral work in that parish, was looking for help in trying to be a pastor in a large congregation. I liked the general concept, but was concerned because the Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod was NOT open and affirming. But when I talked to Ken, he assured me that my gay and lesbian candidates for training would have no trouble at their training facility in St. Louis, Missouri. When the six of us returned from our 5-day training, our Stephen Ministry program was off and running. It was an immense success.

When Annie and I joined IUCC in 2008, during our annual AIDS Walk, I was walking/talking with Pastor Paul and brought up the fact that I was a Stephen Ministry Leader. Paul liked the idea, and in 2010 the Stephen Ministry program became a reality at IUCC. It's still going and, because the national Stephen Ministry program revamped its entire training, IUCC decided to revamp and sharpen its program.

On May 20, 2023, we began our new training class with 6 new trainees...all men. (We are in a very different and interesting world.) This is exciting because I consider Stephen Ministry to be one of the best Jesus/Christ-centered church programs with which I have ever been involved in 65+ years of pastoring. I call it an "Easter" (transforming) opportunity.



Committee Work

Another part of my role as Moderator was to participate on various ministry committees in an ex-officio capacity:

- It's been a pleasure to collaborate with the Fund
 Development Committee to help create strategies to
 enhance stewardship and launch the Legacy Circle.
- My work with the Child Care Committee was very fulfilling as we brainstormed ways to assist the preschool with promotions and ways to increase enrollment.

 I've been excited to work with the Membership Committee (also known as the "Originators") to help develop new ways to welcome, recruit, and involve new members in the life of the congregation.

While I'll be stepping away from those committees (at least for a while), I'm hoping to get more involved with the Communications Ministry in a more active way. I'm excited about Alex Ingal's work on the new IUCC website and hope to assist in any way that I can. I've started out by designing a new church brochure and will soon embark on rewriting the "Our History" section of the website. I'm hoping to provide a clearer and more comprehensive history of how our congregation came to be and how it has changed and evolved over the years. I'm really looking forward to it!

Newsletter

Craig Tyrl

Journey of the Self, Rediscovery and Recovery of the Sacred Self - Part 1

Abraham Maslow developed a psychological model for self-actualization, reflecting hierarchical levels of personal development. This psychological construct is seen in the flesh and blood life journey of Craig Tyrl. He is currently enjoying the fruits of his hard work and success in rediscovering and recovering his sacred self, his inner child. Craig is empowered to creatively function at a high level of effectiveness as our Administrative Pastor. His preaching is already excellent, in spite of little experience. The Craig we see today did not exist thirty years ago, though. He relates:

"[I was] a scared little boy who had to run away to find myself, along the way to find sex, drugs, and [learn to] rock love and purpose through artistic self-expression."

Craig found his voice, the essence of who and what he is at the core of his soul, through artistic self-expression in the performing arts. He worked very hard and spent many years developing his talent and skills. Through his thoughts and actions, he created the Craig we know today. He struggled to overcome fear, loneliness, feeling lost and off track, and disbelief in the possibilities for positive change.

Human potential is a wonderful thing. Even more wonderful is seeing the actualization of that potential, the beautiful blossoming of human personhood. Craig's life journey has at times been difficult and painful. He has had his challenges (chapters) in life. The first chapter was being on a "journey to the self," which is ongoing. The second chapter was his vocational pursuit. The third chapter was the devastating end of a five-year marriage, resulting in divorce from his husband. It was incredibly painful. Craig was overcome with shock and tremendous loss.

The direction of Craig's life changed after being cast in the musical *Damn Yankees*. This placed him on the spiritual path to find and release his sacred inner child. The director of the musical, Jim Taulli, with California State University, Fullerton (CSUF), became Craig's best friend. Later, Craig became a teacher of singing and drama at CSUF. He developed his talent and performance ability. Thought by thought and action by action, he self-created himself through artistic self-expression. He became unbound from the things that tie us down and became free to fully express himself.

In 1996, Craig graduated with a Master's Degree in Theology. This degree helped fulfill his desire to become

an Augustinian Friar in the Catholic Church. For two years he participated in a six-year program to become an Augustinian friar.

When Craig was asked what his mission or purpose in life was, he responded, "The love you leave behind." This is agape love, the highest form of love. Bil Aulenbach, a member of our congregation, has talked about agape love for the last few years.

Craig was born in Stillwater, Oklahoma, in 1971. His mother was kind and loving, but his father used physical punishment and Craig was afraid of him. Nevertheless, he loved his father, learned his father's hard work ethic, and enjoyed what he considers a basically happy childhood.

Craig realized he was gay in the 7th grade because he had a crush on a boy saxophone player in the school band. He didn't come out until about age 21, though. Both parents and family were supportive. There was a school incident in the 7th grade that set Craig back about eleven years. There was a discussion in which someone predicted he would be gay in the future. This was very upsetting, and Craig did everything he could to act like he was not gay.

Things changed after high school graduation when Craig moved to Atlantic City. There were big city lights, new nightlife, and introduction to gay bars. He worked in a casino. He lived a double life, part straight and part gay. He got involved with drugs, and later had to battle addiction.

In the beginning of Craig's vocational journey, when he was focusing on the performing arts, he was not only extremely uncomfortable with any kind of performing before an audience, but also lacked self-confidence in his basic performing ability. He worked very hard and put in a lot of hours, little by little developing his performing ability. Over time, he improved exponentially. He enjoyed teaching the performing arts, as well as directing. He and Kristen Campbell started *The Wayward Artist* theater group approximately five years ago.

Craig planned on teaching at CSUF, then retiring and living the good life. This all changed when he was invited to become the Administrative Pastor at IUCC. For Craig, this position is a calling. He mentioned interest in the position to Pastor Sarah, and she took it from there. Craig is entering a new chapter in his life, free and unbound, with the flourishing of his sacred inner child, and being our new Administrative Pastor.

In *Part Two*, we will discuss Craig's calling to the ministry, the sacred inner child, self-creation and existentialism, and Craig's responsibilities as our administrative pastor.



Hopeful or Hopeless?

Recently, as I turned on to freeway 405, my thoughts fell back to the past when I was driving this freeway for the first time after moving from Minnesota to California. I smiled at my young twenty-five-year-old self, a newlywed full of love and bubbling with hope. My ever-present hopefulness was like my mantra, a chanting of "I think I can. I think I can."

Now, traffic suddenly stopped and I was jolted out of my thoughts and returned to the present. As I sat and waited to move on, I mused that I was no longer that young woman. I had gained in years, experience, and knowledge. Yet, I admired the hopefulness of my young self. In my senior years, I'm aware of an atmosphere of fear because of multiple problems both national and worldwide. Sometimes it feels unrealistic to be hopeful.

I finally turned off the freeway and arrived at my destination. Yet my thoughts continued to travel. Could the hopeful spirit of my youth return to envelop and sustain me in old age? I desired a hope that would ease my concerns, reduce my fears and disappointment, and keep me free of self-pity. That evening, I sat on my patio and watched the setting sun. A sky of pale pink and baby blue gradually merged into a radiant, deep magenta as the sun lowered into the horizon. I can't explain it, but that miracle of nature gave me hope. It was as though the rich color and magical movement embodied my spirit.

A friend confided that he didn't think the word hope was useful. In his thinking, it is non-active, a passive condition. In comparing hope to the active nature of love, he found it lacking. I disagree. I experience hope as being active. Active, largely because an undergirding of hope strengthens and emboldens me, and motivates me to take action. As Emily Dickinson wrote (c. 1877),

Hope is a strange invention —
A Patent of the Heart —
In unremitting action
Yet never wearing out ...

I like Dickinson's perception of hope as *unremitting* action that never wears out. Other voices add to an understanding of the importance of hope. William Arthur Ward wrote, *Life without hope is like a year without* spring. (1921-1994) An Irish proverb states that *Hope is the* physician of each misery. Another writer says, *Hope is our* friend when every other friend has fled (Charles Raymond, 1907). Obviously, I'm not the first person to contemplate the meaning and value of hope.

Dictionaries define hope as a feeling of expectation, as the grounds for believing that something good may happen. I need – and want -- to be a hopeful person. How can I continually welcome and acquire hope in my life? I am learning that it takes intentionality, the intentional practice of a positive spirit in the face of difficulties. That seemed easier to me when I was a young woman embarking on life. In my senior years I've lived long enough to know a thing or two about a thing or two. So, with the knowledge that life is not always kind, consistent, or safe, I want to be intentional at cultivating a spirit of hope. Perhaps one avenue for me is to meditate and to pay attention to nature just as I did the evening when I watched the setting sun.

A couple of years ago my daughter was in a serious car accident on freeway 405. Her embracing of hope kept her focused on healing and full recovery. Hope was valuable for her physical, mental, and emotional health. Her spirit of hope helped her and all of us who love her to deal with a difficult situation. Once again, Emily Dickinson's words come to mind:

Hope is the thing with feathers — That perches in the soul — And sings the tune without the words — And never stops — at all. (c. 1861)

May hope perch in my soul, and yours – and never stop at all. I'm comforted that this may be possible because as Alexander Pope wrote, *Hope springs eternal in the human breast*.
