Comma Groups 2023-2024

The members of IUCC have enjoyed a small group experience called “Comma Groups” since the Fall of 2011. These groups:

- Expand current relationships, giving members deeper connections with each other.
- Provide opportunities for visitors and new members to become part of our community.
- Provide a safe context for stimulating discussions and conversations around topics and issues that are important to our church and its members.

A Comma Group consists of 8 to 10 people who sign up to be part of a six month experience. The groups meet once a month in a member’s home, at church, or at a restaurant for a meal and discussion of a predetermined topic. The groups are designed to be friendly, conversational, personal and spiritual. Members have time to catch up with what is going on in each other’s lives as well as share thoughts about the mission and vision of our church. Each group has a volunteer leader who coordinates discussion while each member participates in decisions regarding where to meet and what to eat.

AIDS WALK on October 7

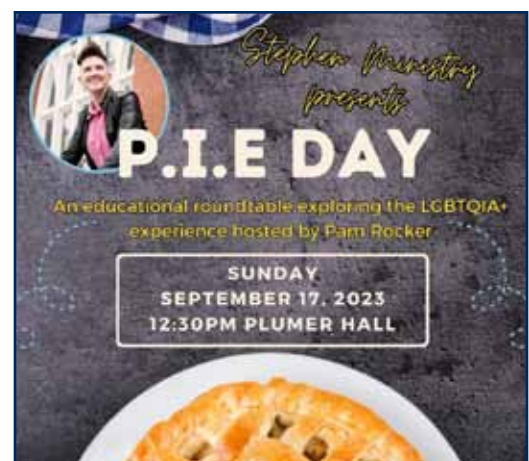

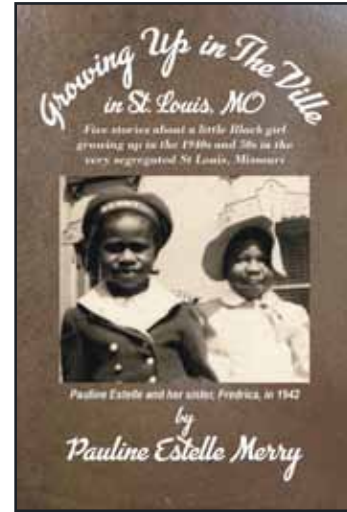

From the Senior Pastor

It's that time of year when even if you don't have children, you feel the "back to school" energy in the air. My kids both started school two weeks ago. Our district, like many, has decided that the post Labor Day start time we'd all become so accustomed to was just a little too late. So in the heat and humidity of August we summon all

of our energy, get our last hurrahs in and head back to school. This year was a big year for my family: Micah began kindergarten.

He'd spent the last nearly 3 years at our IUCC Early Childhood Center. It was an interesting time to begin. In September of 2020 most of the world was still "dark" - we had just opened back up after being closed for several months. There were only 12 students. Most of you know the struggles we faced. Yet, as a parent I felt the relief of getting out of my home, the safe prison of a two bedroom condo, where everyone is on top of each other constantly. I was only too eager to get my two year old out of the house. And what a relief it was to know our preschool was committed to safe standards. I had the privilege to work with Irma Rosales, our preschool director, during our most challenging of times. She and our team of teachers created a safe space where my two year old came into his own. They potty trained him. (I'd been eager with Mollie, a little more lazy with the second child, and it made everything so simple to have them take on the task). It was his home away from home. I watched as he flourished there, soon the ambassador of welcome to other new kids as they joined along the way. When we finally got to graduation last June, I reflected on everything Micah and his classmates had been through. It certainly wasn't the traditional preschool experience, but as a parent I felt nothing but gratitude. And as the pastor, I felt nothing but pride.

You've heard us talk a lot about our preschool over the last 9 months and all that we've done to ensure that the Atwood Building is up to par and competitive with other preschools in the area, but I want to remind you of what it's all about: the heart of our school, the heart of our church, is love. It's being a safe space, a refuge (in my case from the quarantine back in 2020), a place where growth is encouraged (even if it's challenging sometimes), a warm hug when you're hurting and a smile to let you know you're on the right path: you've got this.

So as we all get in that "back to school" spirit, I hope you'll feel that "back to church" spirit too, knowing that we are the safe space, the soft landing when the world can be scary, or lonely, or overwhelming. This may be exactly what you need right now. Come over, we're here. Or maybe you've got this - thank God - now help us ensure we're the space for someone new- so they feel secure, safe, loved and encouraged to grow, learn, and feel welcomed home at IUCC. .

This is going to be a great month! We start the month with Labor Day, and this year we've seen a number of strikes with workers like writers and actors along with hotel workers and nearby UPS drivers, all pushing back against bad contracts. As we observe this day and rest, we also pause to think about the need for safe, healthy, respectful working environments where a worker can receive a living wage. The United Church of Christ has been committed to economic justice for decades, standing with workers and working alongside them to ensure dignity in the workplace. This Labor day we are welcoming Laura Shapiro a writer with the writer's guild to share her story as a writer on strike, along with workers from Kingspan who are standing up for respectful, safe workplaces and a healthy environment. Please join us to connect, learn, and support these workers as we consider how people of faith stand for economic justice.

Then it's our Welcome Back Sunday, also known as Rally Day, where we rally our church family to return back after summer. We'll have new IUCC t-shirts for sale, so consider getting into the spirit and showing off your IUCC pride! We had a great summer here at IUCC as we reflected on God in the secular exploring Disney films in our series: Animated Faith. While we have very much missed our choir, our music team brought us special music as they made the characters come to life. It was as if Mary Poppins, Elsa, Rapunzel, Moana, and Mirabel (among others) were right here among us singing their hearts out! I'm amazed at how our musical community practically put on a different show every week. Their caliber of music and embodiment of the characters moved me each Sunday. It's hard to say goodbye to the summer, but it's made easier knowing that First Service will welcome back the choir and Second Service will return to its shorter services. We've missed all of your voices (and faces) and can't wait to see you back at the chance! Be sure to invite families back as

we'll have a special celebration and a pool party for the kids after church that day.

The following week we'll be sitting down with the Rev. Bill Aulenbach to learn about his new book entitled "How to Make Love with Jesus." That's a pearl-clutching title if I ever heard one! The Stephen Ministry is offering its first "Stephen Ministry Presents" to explore more deeply the LGBTQ experience. Then on September 24, we have our All Church Picnic! Be sure to join us at William Mason Park (and wear your new IUCC tee) -we'll be at shelter number one as usual.

I look forward to seeing you back at church as we embrace the energy, the Spirit, and the excitement of returning home and beginning again together.

The IUCC Legacy Circle



August was Make-A-Will Month, a time to take action for yourself and the people you love. Surprisingly, only one-third of all adults in the U.S. currently have a will. If you are one of them, please consider the lasting impact your legacy could have. After all, the future is something we can protect. The good news is that organizing your affairs does not need to be a complicated or expensive project. Here are a few tips to help you get started:

- 1. Comprehensive Asset List:** List all of your assets, such as investments, properties, bank accounts, and those sentimental possessions like art and jewelry that mean a lot to you.
- 2. Ensuring the Future You Want:** Review all of the beneficiary designations of your life insurance, investment, and retirement accounts. Make sure they align with your current wishes.
- 3. An Evolving Will:** If you already have a will in place, remember to review it every couple of years. Update it with any new assets and make any necessary changes to your wishes.
- 4. Trusting Your Executors:** While reviewing your plans, also consider the executors that you have chosen. Trust is vital, so make sure they are still capable and willing to fulfill their responsibilities.
- 5. The First Steps Matter:** If you haven't made a will yet, seek guidance from a lawyer or explore free online tools like Free Will (www.freewill.com) or Trust & Will (www.trustandwill.com). They might not be for everyone, but they can be a valuable starting point for thinking through your plans.

For the sake and peace of mind of your loved ones, take action now. Get your affairs and final wishes legally documented to spare your loved ones any unnecessary burdens at a difficult time. As part of this process, we hope you will include IUCC and the Legacy Circle as part of your personal legacy. I would like to continue to share my ideas of what I think Progressive Christianity is today (see my ideas 1-4 in the August 2023 newsletter):



5. Listening to young people as they share their ideas of what the church should be in the 21st century.

Us old guys have had our say and day. Now we have to get out of their way. It's time for new voices to say what works for them. That's why it is so fulfilling for me to see so many young people involved at IUCC and to see their willingness to assume leadership.

6. For almost 2,000 years the church has preached that "Jesus died for our sins."

In my own writings and those of so many younger clergy, that concept is ancient history. Young minds are much more interested in promoting agape: unconditional love with lots of forgiving and a heavy emphasis on caring for "the least of these." They want to eliminate poverty and injustice.

7. There's a great deal of difference between legal justice and moral justice.

PC demands, as did Jesus, moral justice, which is justice for all, not just those with money. Consequently, we are starting to see prisons and jails becoming vacant, and bail bonds eradicated except for the most horrendous crimes. PC wants prisons and jails to become rehabilitation centers to offer inmates life skills and a new beginning, not caged like animals and dehumanized.

It's ideas such as these that are going to bring new life into dying churches. For the past 10 years, about 4,000 churches a year closed their doors. In my new book, *"How to Make Love (agape kind) With Jesus,"* I offer a glimpse of the church of the future.

The Wisdom of Abby

A friend emailed me recently and asked, “Are you happy?”

After giving it some thought, the word “happy” seemed narrow or limiting, perhaps because we use it so often. There is a surface or skin-deep element to it. Consequently, I responded to my friend, “Yes, I’m happy. But, more importantly, I’m joyfully content.”

Never in my life had I imagined that as an older person I would enjoy life as I do. Yet, now in my eighties, I am experiencing an unforeseen joyful contentment. I remember those days of yore when I rushed off to work, and on my way saw an elderly person sedately sitting on his front porch. I envied him. I was furiously trying to meet a work deadline, so I mused how pleasant it would be to sit and calmly watch the world go by. In my fifties, I had a dream of a silver-haired woman spending her days attentively tending her potted plants on her patio. When my dream zoomed in on the woman, I found she had my face. The dream unearthed an unconscious desire. A desire to be joyfully content.

Well, now I’m the person on the porch, the one tending her plants, the one watching others pass by. I’m the one reading until two in the morning if I wish. I’m the one having time to write a book. I’m the one lingering over coffee or wine with friends for as long as I please. As people say, “What’s not to like?” I’m joyfully content.

Yes, there are plenty of upsetting things that seep into contentment – illness, politics, injustice -- the list is long. We can choose to marinate in them, count them like notches on a belt, and curse the unfairness found in life. Or, since elders have more time, we could devote some time to addressing such issues in a positive way like some of my ninety-year-old friends do. Even with declining health, they support deserving causes through words,

donations, and actions. I saw an epigram that appears to be their mantra. It read, “What God requires of us is that we not stop trying.” (Bayard Rustin, 1912-1987) In our trying, our striving, we may not live to see the end goal but anything worthwhile takes time. In contributing, we can feel contentment in knowing that we had a part in bringing about good.

I love it when a young person becomes my role model. Nine-year-old Abby’s contentment was interrupted with disappointment when her teacher didn’t assign her the desk she wanted. With a maturity beyond her years, she tossed her curly red locks, and said with a giggle, “You take what you git, and you don’t throw a fit.” How did she get to be so sensible? Did her grandparent or teacher instill that ditty in her head? Did she read it in her favorite book? Whatever or whomever the source, she heard it and she got it.

In contrast, there was a man of my acquaintance who didn’t *get* it. One morning after learning that his wife ran out of his favorite brand of breakfast cereal, he threw a hissy fit, yelling and stomping out of the house. He certainly believed he was the center of the universe in that household. He lacked the wisdom of

Abby to deal with minor problems.

As disappointing as it is, I’ve learned that the world doesn’t revolve around me. I don’t always get my way. My expectations aren’t always met. If things don’t go as we’d like, we can pout and claim, “It’s not fair.” Others may point a finger and say, “It’s his (or her) fault,” or “Nobody cares.” Some, more philosophically, say “It’s God’s will,” or “That’s life. Win some. Lose some.”

In the face of disappointment and unmet expectations, I vote for Abby’s wisdom: You take what you git, and you don’t throw a fit. Maybe then we’ll be happy, or better yet, joyfully content.
